What does our Central Office do?

The San Mateo County Fellowship's Central Office belongs to the A.A. groups of San Mateo County. We help carry A.A.'s message in the following ways (and more):

- Maintain a 24/7 telephone line which responds to inquiries from still-suffering alcoholics seeking help, A.A. members in need of information, and from members of the professional community and the general public. After office hours, this line is staffed by Teleservice volunteers.
- Maintain a Twelfth Step volunteer list.
- Maintain and publish group meeting schedules; in print, on our website, and in the Meeting Guide App.
- We stock a large selection books and pamphlets for sale (many are available in Spanish).
- We offer sobriety chips for sale, for both individuals and groups.
- We work closely with local A.A. service committees: Bridging the Gap, Hospitals and Institutions, Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community, as well as with San Mateo County General Service District 5 and the Northern California Council of **Alcoholics Anonymous**
- We support and participate in many local A.A. events such as Unity Day and the holiday Alkathons.
- We maintain our web site, aa-san-mateo.org, with up-
- to-date meeting listings, a schedule of A.A. events, the High Sobriety newsletter, and links to other A.A. web
- We maintain a library of A.A. speaker CDs which are available for rent for a nominal fee.
- We publish the newsletter, High Sobriety, sent at no charge to all registered San Mateo County A.A. groups and available by subscription to all A.A. members. Faithful Fivers receive a free copy as well.

Who pays for our Central Office? We, the members of A.A., do. Our Seventh Tradition states that we are self-supporting through our own contributions. Central Office also receives donations from individual alcoholics (such as through our Faithful Fivers program). Other sources include our annual anniversary party and income from the sale of A.A. literature.

Central Office is open M-F from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm (open Wednesdays until 6:00 pm).

Into the Fellowship, One Step at a Time

Step One - We admitted we were powerless over alcohol - that our lives had become unmanageable.

In my home group, we made a group conscience decision that whenever anyone new showed up or returned, we would focus on that person and the topic would be the First Step.

The First Step, as described in the Big Book, asks me to admit and accept that I am an alcoholic to my innermost self. That was not easy for me to do. My life, since I was a child, was geared at running the show according to Larry. I was the director. I was the stage manager. I was the prop guy. I was always the one in charge.

There was no room for debate. I had the last word. I knew everything about everything, and it was my job to let everyone know this. No one could penetrate the defenses that I'd carefully constructed ever since I left my mother's body. I knew that the world was unfriendly and even hostile. That first drunk, not the first drink, convinced me that I was Superman--bulletproof and someone everyone should know and admire. I was above the law, moral behavior, and people.

I chased that first drunken magic into the gates of hell--through failed relationships, jails, blackouts, seizures, job losses, moves from one city to another city to another state, car crashes, emergency rooms, violence, and rage. My only emotions were rage and sullen silence. I crashed and burned. In a blackout, I called Alcoholics Anonymous one early morning after the bars were closed. I had run out of alcohol again. And I was desperate not to drink again.

Someone came over to my empty apartment, picked me up, fed me, and cleaned me up. Then he took me to a meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous. He asked me no questions. He just listened as I

tried to explain how and why my apartment was destroyed. He just nodded. He didn't judge me. He didn't preach. He just nodded. He took me to meetings for what seemed a long time. He never told me his full name. He introduced me to a man he called his sponsor. I was asked if I wanted to be sober. I mumbled, "Yes." I was not talking coherently at the time. I was asked if I believed in anything. I mumbled, "Yes." I was asked what I believed in. I answered, "A drink." They all laughed. Not at me. With me. They understood. That was my First Step, into Alcoholics Anonymous. Laughter was foreign to me at the time. Now I can laugh from the bottom of my toes to the top of my skull.

The Steps follow one another, One through Twelve. There are also Twelve Traditions. There are also Twelve Concepts of service. But the First Step means I don't take the first drink, no matter what. And there have been times when it seemed absolutely necessary to take that first drink. I'm an alcoholic. My body craves alcohol. It aches for alcohol. And my body is allergic to it. That's the baffling part of my disease. My mind tells me to take a drink. I always did. Always.

So meetings took the place of the bar. Then meetings took the place of my family. Then meetings took the place of my car. Then meetings took the place of my way. Then meetings took the place of my will. Then meetings took the place of my sponsor. Then meetings took the place of my disease. Then meetings... Am I to live as the hole in the donut? Am I consigned to live in darkness and black and white? It turned out that the answer was no. Color returned. Balance arrived in areas of my life, by surprise. Without my permission. Love filtered in a bit at a time, until that hole inside me, empty so long, was filled with joy, kindness, caring, and passion, and the Promises started coming true in my daily life.

I'm an alcoholic. I'm powerless over alcohol. That's my truth today. And it's alright with me.

AA Takes Root in Khon Kaen

A member moves to a remote part of Thailand and helps get meetings started

I moved from Aberdeen, Scotland, to Bangkok, Thailand, in 1995. I'd like to tell people I moved here for the beautiful beaches, friendly people, and rich Buddhist culture, but in reality, I moved because I could get cheap drink and over-the-counter sedatives to get through a day's work, which enabled me to buy more drink for the evening.

Five years of hell later, and after visiting fifteen different hospitals in Bangkok for alcohol-related incidents, illnesses, and detoxes, I surrendered and my Higher Power showed me the way to an AA meeting. This was in August 2000, and my life has changed for the better beyond my wildest expectations.

My wife and I decided to leave Bangkok to open a restaurant in northeast Thailand, where she had some family. After my five years of drinking in Bangkok, I had now been sober for four years; sufficient time, I thought, to carry on my abstinence from alcohol. My sponsor and most of my AA friends told me that it would not be as easy as I thought.

In June 2004, we moved to Khon Kaen, an area that then had no AA meetings; the nearest loner member lived about three hours away in Sakkon Nakhon. On my first day there, with my wife working and my daughter at school, I found myself alone and with time on my hands--dangerous for this alcoholic, especially in a strange town.

I thought I would be able to go down to the local expat bar and sit there drinking lemonade while engaging in conversation with the heavy drinkers. I experienced a fear that my self-will was trying to run the show again. Luckily for me, my Higher Power had other ideas.

The Big Book says: "Practical experience shows that nothing will so much insure immunity from drinking as intensive work with other alcoholics."

The next day, following this suggestion, I sought contact with alcoholics in Sri Nakarin Hospital. The doctor heading the alcoholic unit there was absent and the nurses pointed me in the direction of the local Government Alcohol and Drug Treatment Centre on the outskirts of the city.

On arrival there by tuk tuk (motorized rickshaw), armed with the Thai Big Book and several pamphlets in Thai, I met a nurse, Oi. When I finished my pre-planned spiel in very basic Thai, she said to me in English, "I have heard of AA, and it would be wonderful if you could start an AA meeting here."

Oi said the aftercare program had been only minimally successful, with a very high recidivism rate. She consulted with the treatment program director, who was very excited about the possibility of an AA meeting there.

I met with two alcoholics the following week, Gai and Yo, who are now members of AA. We had our first AA meeting on July 1, 2004, with five members present. We started having meetings twice a week, on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. There were up to thirty alcoholics attending.

In late 2004, members, nurses, and doctors took a trip to Bangkok to go to meetings, including the Thai-language meeting at St. Lois Hospital and the English-language one at Ruam Rudee. This was a huge success, with everyone experiencing the strong Fellowship there.

This was followed by a group from Bangkok, and a pair from Sakkan Nakhon, coming to Khon Kaen for a meeting. Many Bangkok AA members shared their experience and came up with many ideas and solutions to some early problems we'd had.

Some new members I'd spoken to had believed they were lacking willpower; this belief was gradually extinguished. Many of them had thought alcoholism a moral failing.

Members are reporting that they have found a release from care, boredom, and worry, where previously they had either gone to a monastery for several months, a Thai tradition, or stayed at home white-knuckling the craving. They have found fellowship with other alcoholics.

Some have described having had spiritual experiences, which is obvious in their general appearance. The thoughts that I'd had before, about Thai alcoholics not being interested in AA due to religious, social, language, and

cultural differences, have been replaced by a really positive, enthusiastic feeling for the future of AA in the area and in the whole of Thailand.

The Thai-language meeting format, along with the translated Preamble, How it Works, and the Promises, have been an enormous help. Just like the new members, my life was miserable, I came to AA, and now my life has taken on a new meaning.





Beginners' Book contains member stories taken from past issues of *Grapevine*, and sorts them into 7 sections: 1) You Don't Have to Drink Today, 2) Out of Isolation, 3: Tools for Recovery, 4) Experience, Strength, and Hope, 5) A Design for Living, 6) A Daily Reprieve, and 7) Letting Go of Old Ideas.
