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#### What does our Central Office do?

The San Mateo County Fellowship's Central Office belongs to the A.A. groups of San Mateo County. We help carry A.A.'s message in the following ways (and more):

- Maintain a 24/7 telephone line which responds to inquiries from still-suffering alcoholics seeking help, A.A. members in need of information, and from members of the professional community and the general public. After office hours, this line is staffed by Teleservice volunteers.
- Maintain a Twelfth Step volunteer list.
- Maintain and publish group meeting schedules; in print, on our website, and in the Meeting Guide App.
- We stock a large selection books and pamphlets for sale (many are available in Spanish).
- We offer sobriety chips for sale, for both individuals and groups.
- We work closely with local A.A. service committees: Bridging the Gap, Hospitals and Institutions, Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community, as well as with San Mateo County General Service District 5 and the Northern California Council of Alcoholics Anonymous
- We support and participate in many local A.A. events such as Unity Day and the holiday Alkathons.
- We maintain our web site, *aa-san-mateo.org*, with up-
- to-date meeting listings, a schedule of A.A. events, the High Sobriety newsletter, and links to other A.A. web sites,
- We maintain a library of A.A. speaker CDs which are available for rent for a nominal fee.
- We publish the newsletter, High Sobriety, sent at no charge to all <u>registered</u> San Mateo County A.A. groups and available by subscription to all A.A. members. Faithful Fivers receive a free copy as well.

Who pays for our Central Office? We, the members of A.A., do. Our Seventh Tradition states that we are self-supporting through our own contributions. Central Office also receives donations from individual alcoholics (such as through our Faithful Fivers program). Other sources include our annual anniversary party and income from the sale of A.A. literature.

Central Office is open M-F from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm (open Wednesdays until 6:00 pm).

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# 9TH STEP RIDE

# A biker calculates the price of peace

In early sobriety an old-timer whom I admired once said to me, "Scotty, one day you're gonna have to do these Steps for real!"

That day came at five years of sobriety. At that time I seemed to be getting sicker. It wasn't really that my habits had changed. It was that my head had, and I couldn't stand the way I was anymore. It's been said that while many people make it to five years of sobriety, the numbers drop off significantly after that. This statistic made me nervous. I tried more meetings, but that didn't seem to work. Something had to give.

So I got in touch with a guy I knew from a men's Step study. I went to him and said, "Okay, what do I do now?" He responded by handing me a Big Book before sending me off with much reading and writing to do. So I did what he said and then returned for a new assignment. It was like taking a class in college, then doing the homework. The end result was that I rather quickly became somebody I really liked, somebody really cool.

Eventually, though, my involvement in AA beyond meeting attendance tapered off and I began to rest on my laurels. By six-and-a-half years of sobriety, I was again in emotional pain.

It was summertime and I was about to embark on one of my cross-country, multiple-month motorcycle rides. The open highway, a good running bike, a sunny day, no time limits, and a few bucks to spare--my personal idea of nirvana. I could hardly wait!

And so the day came when I hit the road with extra clothes stuffed into the saddlebags, a tent and sleeping bag strapped behind. But inside, I still hurt. The pain, it seemed, was following.

I headed for a place I'd been to many times before, a place I knew I'd be happy: Serenity Run, a small, sober motorcycle rally located in Colorado. The rally was good and the friendship even better, but the pain persisted.

But there was good news on the horizon, for after the Serenity Run, I would move on to the Sturgis Rally in South Dakota. This was one I'd attended many times before, and always had a good time. The event went great. I saw old friends, picked up a few concerts, did my fair share of dancing, and attended many AA meetings. But it was not enough, for the pain was not diminished and again my fun was mostly feigned.

My next plan was to ride out and visit an old girlfriend who lived in Minnesota. That would fix it for sure! But it only made things worse. And so I rode on.

Eventually I found myself holed up in a cheap hotel in Billings, Montana. The weather had turned cold now and, knowing no one in that fair city, isolation mounted into everdeepening despair. Desperation. It thickened.

For some reason, the Ninth Step came to mind. I'd done some Ninth Step amends before, but had carefully avoided any that had to do with money. Being the self-centered tightwad I am, I'd determined that those were the amends I didn't have to make. But my growing desperation soon spawned a new willingness and with it a decision was made. First: I'd ride south and into warmer weather again (motorcycle riders will understand the wisdom of this decision). Second, I'd return to my little hometown in the mountains of southern California--the place I'd done most of my drinking--and give some money to the landlord I'd run out on over six-and-a-half years before. His name was on my list of amends and I owed him \$500. I figured I'd offer him \$250 as a start. The idea already made me mad. But it didn't really matter, I reasoned, since I wasn't having too much fun anyway.

The further south I went, the warmer it got, and I sat shirtless as the big Harley made its way across the open desert. In a state of semiinsanity by now, I started talking out loud to God about the forthcoming errand. "You know, Big Guy," I said, "I'm not going up there to do this thing because I'm such a nice guy, or even 'cause I'm such a spiritual human being. Truth is, I'm going up here to buy 250 bucks worth of serenity!" At that point I laughed like a drunken hyena. With all other avenues exhausted, desperation was driving me to actual Step work.

Upon arrival, I parked the bike in a space in front of the small office of my former landlord. In a moment, his van pulled into the slot beside my own and he stepped out of the car. "Arthur," I said. "Remember me?" He squinted. "No."

Being a low-bottom drunk, I guessed my appearance must have changed some in the intervening six-and-a-half years, so I reminded him. "Oh . . . yeah," he mumbled, as recognition dawned. Arthur did not look happy to see me. But he'd always been a nice guy. And even through it all, I'd liked him.

"Can I come in and talk for a moment?"

Once seated in the little office, I quickly ran through my pitch. I'd been studying the Ninth Step instructions contained in the little Big Book carried aboard my bike. As instructed there, I spoke briefly of my alcoholism, then emphasized my wish to set right any wrongs I'd done him in the past. "I can offer you \$250 now, then pay the rest when possible. Will that be all right?" It was. When the time came to go, I reached for his hand, but the man surprised me with a big bear hug instead.

So I left Arthur and was soon on the way home to San Diego. As the road opened up ahead of me, my thoughts wandered off to romance and a girl I knew back home who might be able to help fix my problem. Then it hit me: it was a beautiful day, I was doing something I truly loved... and I felt just fine. The pain was gone, replaced by contentment and happiness! I was shocked. An AA talk I'd heard came to mind. "It's amazing," the speaker had said of the Ninth Step, "how for a little money we often sell out our happiness." It was true. Why making this amend had worked when all else had failed, I knew not--and still don't. It just did. And that was good enough.

Within a few months, I'd finished my financial obligation to Arthur. I've run into him on occasion in the years since and we are friends. It took longer to pay the others, but I eventually attended to those, too.

Although sobriety is not always easy, its payoff has often far surpassed whatever dreams I thought I had. We all have the opportunity to go out and take our shot at this life. We become mothers and fathers. Sons and daughters. Families. We buy houses. Attend school. Change, or gain, careers. Become business owners. Get married. Get divorced. Take vacations to Hawaii. Outfit boats and sail around the world. Coach Little League. Travel by motorcycle. The list of things to do and love in this world is endless.

The disease took my shot at life away. AA gave it back.

#### <u>A.A. Around the World</u> Carrying the Message in Hindi A letter from an Intergroup Manager in New Delhi to his online AA group

Please allow me to share my good feelings with all of you. It's the joy of service. Yesterday, a daily newspaper came out with an article in Hindi about Alcoholics Anonymous. It had our helpline number and my personal mobile number, which was included by mistake by the journalist who had interviewed me for the article. The whole day, I was busy receiving calls from alcoholics and their families. I received approximately one hundred calls and, to me, it was really a new experience. Today, I have received approximately ten calls. Yesterday, we had six newcomers at our meeting because of these calls, and we are expecting lots more to come. For us in New Delhi, it's a great start. Promilla, an AA member who was answering our helpline, remarked that she also had received more than one hundred calls. That's big number for us, as we have a total of approximately 300 recovering members in Delhi. May God help us in our new endeavor.

The other good news is that tomorrow, I shall be going to Aloke's place with other members of my online group, Lamplighters, and Pramod and three Lampers will be going to Dharamshala for AA work. We have received a call from Todd, a recovering alcoholic who is trying to start a group there. Language seems to be a barrier. So, we are carrying with us Hindi Big Books and other literature in Hindi. It's a ten-hour drive from Delhi. Dharamshala is a small hill town in HP, famous for the Dalai Lama of Tibet. Oh yeah, one more thing--after yesterday's meeting when I shared with my friends that I was going to Dharamshala to carry the message, members donated twelve Big Books as contributions to be given free to the new group in Dharamshala. I was really touched that the alcoholics were contributing to others' recovery.


