What does our Central Office do?

The San Mateo County Fellowship's Central Office belongs to the A.A. groups of San Mateo County. We help carry A.A.'s message in the following ways (and more):

- Maintain a 24/7 telephone line which responds to inquiries from still-suffering alcoholics seeking help, A.A. members in need of information, and from members of the professional community and the general public. After office hours, this line is staffed by Teleservice volunteers.
- Maintain a Twelfth Step volunteer list.
- Maintain and publish group meeting schedules; in print, on our website, and in the Meeting Guide App.
- We stock a large selection books and pamphlets for sale (many are available in Spanish).
- We offer sobriety chips for sale, for both individuals and groups.
- We work closely with local A.A. service committees: Bridging the Gap, Hospitals and Institutions, Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community, as well as with San Mateo County General Service District 5 and the Northern California Council of **Alcoholics Anonymous**
- ❖ We support and participate in many local A.A. events such as Unity Day and the holiday Alkathons.
- We maintain our web site, aa-san-mateo.org, with up-
- to-date meeting listings, a schedule of A.A. events, the High Sobriety newsletter, and links to other A.A. web sites,
- We maintain a library of A.A. speaker CDs which are available for rent for a nominal fee.
- We publish the newsletter, High Sobriety, sent at no charge to all registered San Mateo County A.A. groups and available by subscription to all A.A. members. Faithful Fivers receive a free copy as well.

Who pays for our Central Office? We, the members of A.A., do. Our Seventh Tradition states that we are self-supporting through our own contributions. Central Office also receives donations from individual alcoholics (such as through our Faithful Fivers program). Other sources include our annual anniversary party and income from the sale of A.A. literature.

Central Office is open M-F from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm (open Wednesdays until 6:00 pm).

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Thumbing for the Holidays

Broke and lonely, a newcomer looking to do service hits the road and gets an unexpected surprise

It was a cold and snowy Christmas morning when I awoke in my friend's apartment. She had flown to California and asked me to house-sit for two weeks and feed her cat. I had been sober for barely two weeks. I was grateful because I had been "sofa surfing" since my car had been repossessed and was no longer available to provide sleeping accommodations.

Even if some of my friends with sofas had not grown tired of me, I didn't want to impose on any of them for too long. I had been attending meetings for a couple of months when someone suggested that I try coming to meetings sober.

So after a particularly disastrous drunk, I did just that. I began attending meetings sober at least once every day.

As the holidays loomed, many groups had parties and served food. I was unemployed and broke and so often these "eatin' meetin'" events were my only opportunity to eat.

Although I connected with several AA members I met at meetings, there were some people I just did not like. Jerry the Professor was one. (It seemed that more AAs had nicknames in those days.) Jerry was a dour, unfriendly fellow. I assumed that he didn't like me, so I avoided him. In fact, when he shared at a meeting, I would get up and go to the kitchen for a cup of coffee or to daydream about something else. I felt that nothing he had to say would be useful to me or help me stay sober.

So there I was in my friend's apartment on Christmas Day. She was not in AA. She was not an alcoholic. I knew there was alcohol in the place but she had put it away in deference to my budding sobriety. If I looked hard enough, I knew I would find it, though.

As my "poor me's" about the loss of my job, my home and my family set in, suddenly I remembered something I had heard at a meeting. It was actually something Jerry the Professor had told about his first sober Christmas and waking up alone. Somehow, he had gotten the idea that helping someone else might keep him sober. He had driven to the Salvation Army soup kitchen and volunteered his time, serving homeless people and driving meals to shut-ins. I couldn't remember when and where he had told this story but right then it was a godsend to me.

I didn't have a car anymore but that, and the fact that the nearest Salvation Army shelter was 40 miles away, didn't stop me. I bundled up and hit the road with my thumb out. The fact that it was Christmas probably inspired drivers to stop for me and I made into Hartford in three rides.

What if they don't need any help? I thought as I neared the soup kitchen. But my fear was unfounded. I was welcomed with open arms and put to work. I sliced turkeys and ladled gravy, waiting on tables set up for transients. I washed dishes, pots and pans. The day passed quickly.

When the last folks had been served and had left, we volunteers sat down to eat. Besides the Salvation Army folks, there were three lovely ladies who had worked as hard as I had all day. Now, shed of their aprons, I saw that they were tastefully dressed, their hair coiffed. They wore expensive jewelry. I felt dowdy in my worn jeans and faded sweatshirt, but they were friendly and asked me where I lived and so on. I burst into tears and confessed that I was just an alcoholic trying to stay sober and that was the only reason I had come in to help. All three of them laughed. "So are we, sweetie!" one woman said. "You're one of us," another said. "I might have known."

A feeling of gratitude like nothing I had felt before came over me. I was truly blessed. The ladies and I left together and went to a nearby meeting, after which they drove me back to my friend's apartment, which was way out of their way. No way would they have me hitchhike in the dark, they said.

As I said my prayers before climbing into bed, I added, "God bless you, Jerry the Professor."

A.A. Around the World

A Pioneer in Paris

Now in his 90s, an old-timer in Europe recalls the early days of AA in France

For me, it all began in the mid 1960s. I was 37, a Spaniard living in Paris who for 20 years had been suffering an interminable progression of misadventures, disasters and disgraces. Finally, my lies, excuses and even my tears had all run out. I was very seriously considering suicide.

Quite unexpectedly, I learned of AA through an article by journalist Joseph Kessel, published in the French newspaper France-Soir. It seemed that a few "gringos" (as I called North Americans in those days, not without a certain disdain) were holding AA meetings at the American Church on Quai d'Orsay in Paris.

So despite myself, I went to a meeting there. As soon as I met these gringos and heard what they had to say, I knew I had found my people. Like me, they had been running away—not really knowing from what, or where to go. Like me, they were idealists who had failed in life, destroyed by drink.

My sponsor was Fuller P. His sponsor was Nick H., and Nick's sponsor was Bill W. You could say I was sort of a great-grand sponsee of one of the original founders of AA. I have never forgotten the human warmth, care and kindness with which those gringos welcomed and helped me. They showed me a shared love through a simple and forgiving spirituality. They stressed the responsibility of passing the message on to other alcoholics in our wine-growing regions of Europe. Here, our culture and customs had given wine,

which was not even considered alcohol, an absurd importance that was treacherous for alcoholics.

Indeed, the Americans had been trying to get a French-speaking group going for more than 14 years, to little avail. A few months later, four of us who had arrived after reading the article in France-Soir opened the first French-speaking AA group in France. That was more than 57 years ago now. Slowly but surely, the obstacles fell away, allowing us to continue and grow.

In AA, we focus on living here and now, one day at a time, 24 hours—the time it takes earth to rotate once on its axis. The Steps, the Traditions, the Concepts and the Promises are each 12 in number, like the 12 months of the year.

With the help of the group and my sponsor, my values began to change. I began to understand that to be happy was simple—the difficult thing was to keep it simple. I began to understand that the more I gave in this world, the more I received. I learned that I needed to prepare myself every day by ironing out the wrinkles that had been in my soul since childhood.

From my very beginning, I had confused living with suffering, perhaps due to an innate hypersensitivity. I was emotionally immature, as my fears had blocked my emotional development. I was poorly armed for coping with life, and a defensive ego had grown within me. When I finally discovered alcohol, this ego grew even stronger and led me to lose sight of reality.

I was an active alcoholic during the 1940s and 1950s, when alcoholism was not yet considered a disease, but rather was believed to result from a lack of willpower. Alcoholics were often given electroshock therapy. No matter how strong the electric shocks, they never managed to transform the soul.

Over the years, I've met many members who, after a time, began to believe they could manage on their own and stopped going to meetings. Even if they don't drink, it is sad to see them. They are like wilted flowers. I believe that once an alcoholic, always an alcoholic. If I don't keep

coming back to meetings to share my experience and recharge my batteries, I will lose the joy of living.

I don't think AA came to exist in the world merely by coincidence just 82 years ago now. It seems to me that we are all still pioneers in this spiritual movement. There have been times I have feared that Alcoholics Anonymous might lose its course and flounder. But guided by a Higher Power and shared love our Fellowship has always overcome obstacles and progressed.


Thank you, dear gringos, who welcomed me to AA, for helping me to see that a spiritual awakening and new moral code could be the solution to all of my problems.

I'm now about to turn 94 years old. I enjoy good health, a marvelous family and a comfortable position, allowing me to regularly attend my AA meetings. I love sharing the best of myself, and reject the notion of becoming an old outdated dinosaur. They call me Manuel of Paris and I belong to Alcoholics Anonymous in body and soul.


