What does our Central Office do?

The San Mateo County Fellowship's Central Office belongs to the A.A. groups of San Mateo County. We help carry A.A.'s message in the following ways (and more):

- Maintain a 24/7 telephone line which responds to inquiries from still-suffering alcoholics seeking help, A.A. members in need of information, and from members of the professional community and the general public. After office hours, this line is staffed by Teleservice volunteers.
- Maintain a Twelfth Step volunteer list.
- Maintain and publish group meeting schedules, in print, on our website, and in the Meeting Guide App.
- We stock a large selection books and pamphlets for sale (many are available in Spanish).
- We offer sobriety chips for sale, for both individuals and groups.
- We work closely with local A.A. service committees: Bridging the Gap, Hospitals and Institutions, Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community, as well as with San Mateo County General Service District 5 and the Northern California Council of Alcoholics Anonymous
- We support and participate in many local A.A. events such as Unity Day and the holiday Alkathons.
- ↔ We maintain our web site, *aa-san-mateo.org*, with up-
- to-date meeting listings, a schedule of A.A. events, the High Sobriety newsletter, and links to other A.A. web sites,
- We maintain a library of A.A. speaker CDs which are available for rent for a nominal fee.
- We publish the newsletter, High Sobriety, sent at no charge to all <u>registered</u> San Mateo County A.A. groups and available by subscription to all A.A. members. Faithful Fivers receive a free copy as well.

Who pays for our Central Office? We, the members of A.A., do. Our Seventh Tradition states that we are self-supporting through our own contributions. Central Office also receives donations from individual alcoholics (such as through our Faithful Fivers program). Other sources include our annual anniversary party and income from the sale of A.A. literature.

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Happily Giving Oh, what a bag of goodies we have to share once we get sober.

Before I came into the rooms of AA, I was absolutely clueless on what the word God meant. That's why I drank to oblivion. I had no answers to this thing called life, so I figured I might as well drink away the pain of "not knowing."

I tried to find God in so many ways. I was raised Catholic. But growing into my teens, I would party with my friends on Friday and Saturday nights, then go to communion on Sunday, be forgiven and do it all again the next week. This didn't work for me.

I became a Christian and decided that Jesus was my savior and that I was born again. I studied the Bible with a beer in hand, then started questioning the treatment of the aboriginal people and their shamans. How could God send them all to hell just for not reading the Bible and for loving the earth? This didn't make sense to me. So I placed my Bible on the shelf.

I started studying Shamanism. I bought a medicine bag that I wore around my neck and decided I was going to "heal the world." What was really cool about being a shaman was that some used peyote in ceremony and if that was acceptable, surely alcohol was OK. I performed many ceremonies under the influence. Using crystals, I would dance naked around a map of the earth, imagining I was healing the world, only to wake up hungover and unable to remember taking my clothes off!

I then decided I'd be more practical. It was the year 1999 and I started preparing for Y2K and the end of the world. I packed buckets of food and stored gas. I waited for martial law but nothing happened. I was wrong. So I kept drinking. Having tried everything to find God, I finally ended up just turning to alcohol. I slept with cans of beer on my living room floor all through the night. When I couldn't stand the pain anymore, I walked into the rooms of AA.

It is here where I had my first real spiritual experience, when a woman gave her time to sit with me, listen to me and help me read and underline the Big Book. That experience of a human being giving time to this stinky drunk with DTs was how I found God. God loved me through her—my first sponsor.

Since then, I have found God in the rooms of AA. Some call God a "Group Of Drunks," and that is true to me. I see God in others.

Christmas season is here and I'm reminded that some people have a Santa Claus God. They ask him for things and expect God to fulfill their expectations. I see this differently. I see it as giving service in AA. Giving our presence, or making coffee, or sponsoring others, or serving in a group position—all these are gifts that money can't buy. Santa Claus is a giver. That's why he's so happy all the time.

In the program, instead of asking for what we want, we learn to give what is needed of us. We become a Santa Claus God—giving the gift of sobriety to those we can help. What a bag of goodies we have to share. What miracles we get to watch as our gifts are opened and used by newcomers who attend their first meeting.

When we forget ourselves and make other people more important, we disappear into a giving that becomes selfless. In giving, we receive happiness and a very merry holiday season.

A.A. Around the World

Early AA in the Cariboo Mountains

A big game hunter accepts that he is powerless over alcohol and becomes the first member of AA in a remote area of British Columbia.

I'm sure my father would have classified himself as "the hopeless variety" alcoholic. He had some choice vocabulary for the more politically correct terms we use today. We won't go into them here but suffice to say he had some practical experience with the disease considering that his entire family were either still practicing or dead as the result of it. "Recovery" did not exist in the interior of British Columbia in the 40s, so folks of his persuasion were not exactly looking for a cure. Instead, they were doomed to a pitiful and incomprehensible life followed by a demoralizing death or worse yet, incarceration at the ever looming institutions for mental health or jail. I think that must be why he had to laugh at the suggestion by his long-term client that it could be otherwise.

My parents had built themselves a storybook hunting lodge in the remote Cariboo region of British Columbia and had successfully developed a reputation in the U.S. for trophy-hunting—mostly grizzly, deer and moose. It was a Seattle client and his friend who'd been coming to our lodge for many years who finally asked my father the important question, "Do you think you have a drinking problem?" He quickly assured them that he was not completely blind and admitted not only to the present problem but the future one as well. No one in his family had ever gotten sober and so there was definitely no hope for him.

All that they had built and that my mother and he had dreamed of was moot. Although we had the kind of childhood most people only fantasize about, it was only a matter of minutes and it would all vaporize like the rye whiskey he loved to drink. Dad was dark and handsome, quiet and strong—capable of killing grizzly bears on demand but braiding my hair every morning before school. Mom baked bread every day, served her famous Moose stews for 20 across freshly ironed linen tablecloths with sparkling sterling silver and fresh wild flowers. She looked like a 40's movie star but it was her practical wisdom and Swiss precision that their American guests fell in love with. Life was ideal for us all except for that niggling little question the hunter had so quietly asked. "Do you think you have a drinking problem?"

"Define the word problem," I might have said if someone had been so forthright with me. That my father disappeared for weeks with no memory of where he'd been, that he left his wife and children in 40 below temperatures with not enough fuel or food, ... those might have been "problematic" if my mother wasn't so good at covering and so sure that one sober New Years party meant that, "It was all behind them." They had been married twelve years and she still thought she could change him. She knew she would never leave him. The long stretches of sobriety convinced her that he was the husband and father every woman dreamed of.

Dale A. and Stewart R. were the two American hunters and Dale had read in a magazine that there were a group of sober alcoholics meeting in Akron, Ohio. He was fascinated by the combination of those two words side by side: sober and alcoholic. It must have been quite a concept because he immediately wrote a letter to Bill W. and Dr. Bob to see if he could get more information. Within a week, Dale had a letter back! It described in detail how it worked. He probably got a book, too. He then started the very first meeting of AA in the Seattle region. It exists still today and is known as "Group One." He was also able to carry that same message to my father, the alcoholic, who was still suffering. In doing so, Dale gave at least three generations of a very large family, the gift of sobriety. I'm convinced it is only the beginning.

So Dale A. and Stewart R. returned to Seattle, recognizing in my father the disease that they had been so mercifully relieved of. They definitely saw the progression from year to year. They likely related to the skepticism of their Canadian guide as he laughed at the ridiculous prospect of ever being capable of living without booze in this lifetime.

Hunting season closed that year and the fall turned to winter in 1954. My parents 5th child arrived, another child died, and a parcel showed up at the post office from Seattle. In winter months, we lived in our town house so we could be close enough to a school to attend on a daily basis. It was quiet and dad volunteered. He flooded the local hockey rink all winter, danced the two-step in his dressy cowboy boots every chance he got, and walked to the post office every morning to play crib with the post master, have a little snort of rye and oh yeah, pick up the mail.

I can't imagine what he thought when he opened the plain brown wrapper on that particular box but I'm pretty sure it was met with immense curiosity because he sat right down that day and began to read and he read and he read all that day and all that night too. He was still reading when my mother got up the next morning. His words to her were, "I never have to drink again." That was 1954 and his only meetings for the next eight years would be the "loner letters" he received from "Group One" in Seattle.


My own first meeting was in that same house as I hid in the kitchen and listened to a group of my father's peers share their experience strength and hope with each other. It was at this same time in my life that I set up my own little bar in some unfinished construction on the basement stairwell. I had small bottles of every variety and brand of booze I could lay my hands on and it was not unusual for me to go there alone after school and have a couple of social drinks. My father was getting sober and my alcoholism was just budding.

Of my six siblings, only two escaped the disease of alcoholism: the sister that died at three years of age and the one that was born on that very same day. She is not at fault. She seems to have born that way. An older brother died driving drunk at 25 while I dragged my drinking out until I was 35 and was the first of my generation in the family to get sober. My father died at 29 years sober, just a short time before his first child would walk through the doors of Alcoholics Anonymous. I was given his original Big Book by my mother right after I got sober and it has since been passed to two more of his sober children and three of his grandchildren. My oldest daughter jokes that while most families pass the family Bible down from generation to generation, in ours you better watch out for that Big Book when it starts coming your way.

I write this little history for all those who are sober and waiting for the miracle to happen to their loved ones. I write it for the newly sober alcoholic that wonders if they are making a difference, for the sponsor who thinks he's wasting his time on one of the "hopeless variety," for the countless practicing alcoholics that know for certain that their fate is sealed and they will live out the legacy of past generations, dying a lonely and demoralizing death. I write this to express my gratitude for my sober children, Alcoholics Anonymous, Dale A. and Stewart R. and my creator for lining those two hunters up with that particular game guide 53 years ago. To all of them, I owe my magnificent life.

Anniversary Party: Cancelled for 2020 Spanish Central Office: No report.




