What does our Central Office do?

The San Mateo County Fellowship's Central Office belongs to the A.A. groups of San Mateo County. We help carry A.A.'s message in the following ways (and more):

- Maintain a 24/7 telephone line which responds to inquiries from still-suffering alcoholics seeking help, A.A. members in need of information, and from members of the professional community and the general public. After office hours, this line is staffed by Teleservice volunteers.
- Maintain a Twelfth Step volunteer list.
- Maintain and publish group meeting schedules, in print, on our website, and in the Meeting Guide App.
- We stock a large selection books and pamphlets for sale (many are available in Spanish).
- We offer sobriety chips for sale, for both individuals and groups.
- We work closely with local A.A. service committees: Bridging the Gap, Hospitals and Institutions, Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community, as well as with San Mateo County General Service District 5 and the Northern California Council of Alcoholics Anonymous
- We support and participate in many local A.A. events such as Unity Day and the holiday Alkathons.
- We maintain our web site, aa-san-mateo.org, with up-
- to-date meeting listings, a schedule of A.A. events, the *High Sobriety* newsletter, and links to other A.A. web sites,
- We maintain a library of A.A. speaker CDs which are available for rent for a nominal fee.
- We publish the newsletter, High Sobriety, sent at no charge to all registered San Mateo County A.A. groups and available by subscription to all A.A. members. Faithful Fivers receive a free copy as well.

Who pays for our Central Office? We, the members of A.A., do. Our Seventh Tradition states that we are self-supporting through our own contributions. Central Office also receives donations from individual alcoholics (such as through our Faithful Fivers program). Other sources include our annual anniversary party and income from the sale of A.A. literature.

Central Office has resumed regular hours Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.

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A Tough Amend

STEP NINE: Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others

I recently turned 60, and one month later I reached my 32nd AA anniversary. Although my recovery has been quite stable, about a month ago I received some very bad news in an email from my cousin who lives on Long Island in New York.

A man I had known since boyhood had died. I cried when I read about his death. His name was Leon. I had made amends to him when I was just a few years sober. The memory of him made me think about the worst day of my life.

I was just 6 years old when I first met Leon. My mom and dad had gotten a divorce when I was 2. One evening, my mom told me that she was going on a date. She said that our next-door neighbor was going to babysit me while she was out. "If a man arrives while I'm getting ready," she told me, "just let him in." When the doorbell rang, I was sitting by the TV and I jumped up to answer the door. A man was standing there. "My name is Leon," he said. He asked whether my mom was available. I said she was getting ready, and I asked if he was going to be my new daddy.

Leon was a widower. His wife had died two years earlier. Their date that night must have been successful, because a year later Leon and my mother were married. They were together for eight years. During that time, I became a full-blown alcoholic. When I found out they were getting a divorce, I was full of alcoholic rage.

One night, I came home very late and totally drunk. Leon was there as I stumbled in. I started yelling at him. He refused to talk to me while I was drunk. I stormed off in a rage. When I got to my room, I grabbed a hunting knife from my closet and stormed back to confront Leon. Again he refused to talk to me, and he turned his back. I was so drunk that I was not in my right mind. I raised the knife and stabbed him in the back. As I pulled the knife out, he gave out a horrible scream of pain, which is a sound I will never forget.

Instead of falling to the floor dead, Leon turned around and started punching me. One punch landed on my face and I fell to the floor where I hit my head and passed out. When I came to, a policeman was standing above me. I had been handcuffed and my legs were restrained.

Leon was at my trial in juvenile court. When the trial was over, I was convicted of attempted murder. As the judge read his ruling, he informed me that arrangements had been made for me to live with my biological father in Japan. In less than a week, I was on an airplane.

Over the next 13 years, my alcoholism went from bad to worse. At 28 years old, I stumbled drunk into my first AA meeting. Through the grace of God and the program of AA, I have not had a drink since that first meeting.

After several years sober, I applied to law school and was accepted. Several months before moving to begin law school, my sponsor told me that before I went to school, I should travel back to New York to make amends to Leon. I had made many amends up to that point, but not to Leon.

A month later I was on an airplane headed for New York. When I arrived, I rented a car and drove to Leon's place of business. I got there about 11:00 a.m. I sat in the car frozen with fear. I just could not go in. Instead, I headed for a noon AA meeting in town. As I walked in, the secretary came over to me and asked if I was a newcomer. I said that I was not a newcomer and that I was traveling from California. The secretary asked if I would like to chair the meeting. I said yes. I told my story and admitted to the group why I was there. I explained that I had so far failed to make the amends. After the meeting, an elderly couple thanked me for speaking. The man said he and his wife would be happy to go back with me to Leon's business to give me moral support in making my amends.

We drove our cars over to Leon's business. With their encouragement, I walked in the front door. I told the secretary my name and that I would like to speak to Leon if I could. I stood frozen in fear. When the office door opened, I thought I was going to have a heart attack. I had not seen Leon for 18 years. Suddenly, he appeared in the doorway. He looked me over and then walked over and wrapped his arms around me, giving me a big bear hug. I burst into tears and it seemed like I could not stop. And then we walked into his office where we sat down, and I started to speak. Years of baggage seemed to fall off of me.

When I left his office, I felt relief that's hard to describe. The AA couple had waited outside all that time. I told them what had happened, thanked them, and we parted company.

In the following years, I stayed in touch with Leon. The redemption I received gave new meaning to my AA program, which has stood the test of time. I'm so grateful for the blessings I received through this program. I now have a wonderful memory when I think of Leon.

AA Around the World A New Light In Zhengzhou

Stirring souls and touching hearts, a powerful weekend in China brings hope to millions of alcoholics

It was Friday night and a hush fell over the conference center as the opening speaker took to the stage. Tears filled her eyes and a wave of emotion touched all in attendance. The woman spoke of being a young girl dreaming of someday being on the stage as a singer, actress or dancer, but it was her journey through alcoholism and AA that led her to the stage that night.

What made the speaker's words and this gathering of AA and Al-Anon members so special was the place where it was held. We were in the People's Hospital #9, a mental hospital in Zhengzhou, Henan Province, the industrial heartland of China. The People's Hospital was where the How It Works Convention of AA was held in October 2017. Imagine having an AA convention in a mental hospital!

It's difficult to believe in our super-connected digital world where information travels at the speed of light, that the majority of the 1.4 billion people in China have never heard of AA. In fact, in the world's most populous country there are approximately 30 face-to-face meetings, plus a small but growing online community. But China has a small number of dedicated AA members who, along with the support of our General Service Office (GSO) and the Asian Oceanic Service Meeting (AOSM), are out to change that. AA is rising in China.

On Saturday morning, the convention was addressed by members of the medical community. The entire room was encircled by doctors and nurses in uniform as the head of mental health for Henan Province spoke of the benefit they saw in cooperation with AA. The medical staff recognized that the alcoholic patients who attended the two AA meetings held at People's Hospital #9 did not return as patients but instead were showing up as AA volunteers helping to put on the meetings. Those medical professionals who are on the frontline in the treatment of alcoholism in China expressed a real sense of hope and optimism, just as I imagine Dr. Silkworth did when he wrote "The Doctor's Opinion" in the Big Book.

Throughout the weekend, every time we had a break, we would all file out past the locked steel doors of the alcoholic wards. It was a powerful reminder about the destructive outcome of alcoholism: jails, institutions and death. As I walked through the wards, I thought about what my fate would have been without AA. It gave me chills.

I love our AA history. I love hearing about Dr. Bob and the "good oldtimers" and the many struggles AA members faced to carry the message to the suffering alcoholic. Those miraculous days are being replayed in new and wonderful ways right now in China. It felt a little like AA in the 1940s and '50s. Watching one alcoholic helping another, watching the families embrace Al-Anon, watching the spirit of AA at work during those days I spent in China stirred my soul and touched my heart.

As a result of this trip, our Traditions and AA Preamble have come to life for me in a new way. If it weren't for the wisdom that guides our Fellowship, AA in China would never have been possible. The fact that AA has "no opinion on outside issues; hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy" allows the AA Fellowship to flourish because it is not a threat to any ideology or belief.

At times, I have a hard time connecting the money I put in the basket at an AA meeting with AA's work in the wider world. It's easy for me recognize my own story of how AA helped lift me from the alcoholic scrap heap to a life worth living. It's harder to see how that money supports all the efforts of our GSO and International Desk and how we are still helping to change the world. And I mean changing the world in a big way. The money donated in our AA meetings helps send our people from GSO to Mongolia and other places around the globe to help where the light of AA shines. My contribution to the Seventh Tradition matters. It saves lives.

Our Responsibility Declaration screamed in my head throughout the weekend. "I am responsible. When anyone, anywhere, reaches out for help, I want the hand of AA always to be there..."

When I'm Ready

In AA meetings I listen as people speak, and it sometimes seems that God is talking directly to me through them. I always hear exactly what I need to hear. I don't want to just take what I've been given so freely and never pass on the gift. I too want to comfort and aid the sick and suffering alcoholic.

Part of life is to experience hardship. We lose loved ones, watch our parents get old, experience terrible physical and emotional illnesses and struggle with insidious addictions.

But one thing I've known for a very long time is that the one true constant is faith, that inner voice that calls me when I'm ready to begin a dialogue with God. He will hear me. He will fill me with his love when I am ready. God makes me strong, strong enough to deal with life. I need only to be honest, open and willing.

Life also has blessings and joy, especially as I gain awareness of my fellow human beings as described in our Promises. As God's love heals me, I can build a bond with him for others to witness. The darker my path and the longer the time I stumble in darkness, the greater the contrast I can see when I finally reach the light. This for me is one of the greatest miracles of recovery. My obsession with alcohol has been removed by the grace of my Higher Power. The desire to drink is no longer present, whereas it used to be a constant daily activity.

AA has freed me to be more comfortable in my own skin, to be healthier and happier, living fully in today.
