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## What does our Central Office do?

The San Mateo County Fellowship's Central Office belongs to the A.A. groups of San Mateo County. We help carry A.A.'s message in the following ways (and more):

- Maintain a 24/7 telephone line which responds to inquiries from still-suffering alcoholics seeking help, A.A. members in need of information, and from members of the professional community and the general public. After office hours, this line is staffed by Teleservice volunteers.
- Maintain a Twelfth Step volunteer list.
- Maintain and publish group meeting schedules, in print, on our website, and in the Meeting Guide App.
- We stock a large selection books and pamphlets for sale (many are available in Spanish).
- ❖ We offer sobriety chips for sale, for both individuals and groups.
- We work closely with local A.A. service committees: Bridging the Gap, Hospitals and Institutions, Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community, as well as with San Mateo County General Service District 5 and the Northern California Council of Alcoholics Anonymous
- We support and participate in many local A.A. events such as Unity Day and the holiday Alkathons.
- ❖ We maintain our web site, aa-san-mateo.org, with up-
- to-date meeting listings, a schedule of A.A. events, the High Sobriety newsletter, and links to other A.A. web sites,
- We maintain a library of A.A. speaker CDs which are available for rent for a nominal fee.
- We publish the newsletter, High Sobriety, sent at no charge to all registered San Mateo County A.A. groups and available by subscription to all A.A. members. Faithful Fivers receive a free copy as well.

Who pays for our Central Office? We, the members of A.A., do. Our Seventh Tradition states that we are self-supporting through our own contributions. Central Office also receives donations from individual alcoholics (such as through our Faithful Fivers program). Other sources include our annual anniversary party and income from the sale of A.A. literature.

Central Office has resumed regular hours Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.

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STEP 12 Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.

#### CHAIN REACTION

In Twelfth Step work, sometimes we throw a stone, making ripples that keep on going in ways we can't imagine.

As the meeting was ending and the men began to circle up for the closing prayer, I saw the guy step back out through the window and disappear. I ran around the back of the building and "headed him off" in the parking lot.

I introduced myself and asked him if it was his first meeting, as if I couldn't already tell. He said it was and told me his name was John. He had that "deer in the headlights" look. It made me remember my first AA meeting when I didn't know what was happening and was afraid of everyone.

I did my best to try to help him feel more comfortable by sharing just a little bit of my early story. He began to relax and I suggested we go talk over a cup of coffee. I was thrilled when he accepted my invitation.

We went to a coffee shop and talked for over an hour. I shared more of my story and heard a little bit of John's. I wasn't able to get him to ask me to be his sponsor that night, but I would see him from time to time over the next few weeks and months, across our meeting room. Our eyes would meet, and we would exchange a warm, knowing smile. Occasionally we would speak briefly. I learned that he had gotten a sponsor and had taken the Steps, which made sense as he looked calmer and so much more relaxed than he was when we first met. I could see that his skin finally fit.

A few years later, my wife and I attended the anniversary of an Intergroup north of our hometown. All those people who hadn't gotten in on the planning committee early enough ended up being assigned as greeters. There was a veritable phalanx of greeters outside the front door and it felt like the well-wishes would never end. One of those greeters was John. We exchanged a real warm hug.

"How long are you sober, now, John?" I asked. "Six years," he replied. "It looks good on you," I remarked.

The following year we saw each other at the same event and it just felt good to see him again, even though I had played no formal part in his sobriety.

A few years later at the same event, my wife and I had just gotten out of the car at the far end of the parking lot from the event venue. I could see John in the distance, still doing his greeter duty. As we started off across the parking lot, a young man came toward us. He was young, in his 20s, clean-cut and with a confident smile. He was wearing a suit. As he got closer to me, he opened his arms and welcomed me with a big hug, saying, "Thank you." I'd never seen this man before.

"For what?" I asked. What he said next rocked me back on my heels. "For taking my sponsor to coffee on his first night in AA," he replied. I stood there looking at him. "How long are you sober?" I asked. "About three years now," he replied with a smile.

There was no way I could have foreseen that a meeting of two complete strangers years earlier would lead to this moment. We never know where our Twelfth Step activities will take us and the people we seek to help. Here was the second generation of that night.

When we throw a stone in a pond, ripples emanate from the entry point in the water. They progress outward, away from us. They continue on to the far shore, to interact with ripples from a stone thrown by someone else whom we may never meet.

I was brought into the human chain reaction that is AA in 1983 by a man who had 35 days of sobriety. I never met the man who brought him to his first meeting, but in a way, I owe him my life.

Hope Nobody Sees Me!
A member shares his thoughts about the importance of anonymity

What was the worst day of my life? Unfortunately, at age 75, I have quite a few to choose from. But near the top of my Top 10 List was that fateful day 27 years ago when I walked into my very first AA meeting. I only went there to prove to myself that I really didn't belong in this cult.

Terrified, mortified, horrified, sweating and shaking, I walked (staggered, actually) into the Manhasset AA Group.

Could I be an alcoholic? I was certain I was not because I had just given up drinking for two whole days. My brilliant conclusion from that miraculous feat of abstinence was that I didn't need AA. But then at the meeting, I wondered what my personal problems had to do with my nightly drinking. Could I be an alcoholic? And why was I so upset?

Well, I wasn't upset because my life was a shambles or anything ... or because my marriage was on the rocks ... or because my sons were fed up with my behavior. I wasn't upset because I was almost \$200,000 dollars in debt ... or because I had headaches, high blood pressure, anxiety attacks and insomnia. I was actually upset because of my incredible fear that someone I knew might actually see me at the meeting! If I were seen going into an AA meeting, oh, my God, I would be a ruined man.

Of course, it didn't bother me at all when a neighbor saw me urinating on my front lawn at two in the morning.

It took me years in the program to accept the fact that everyone in AA was there for the same reason. We were there to get sober in a safe, nonjudgmental and totally anonymous environment. That "anonymous" part was the most important thing to me at the time.

To me, using our first names is only the first step in being anonymous. There is much more to anonymity. It means absolutely no gossip. It means not repeating what we heard about anyone at the diner or in the parking lot after a meeting—not even to our sponsor.

Sometimes I have found myself breaking that pledge. But when it happens, AA guilt kicks in. I immediately recognize the damage I've inflicted and I take action by apologizing. We old-timers have a responsibility to the newcomers, and to our own sobriety, to ensure a safe meeting environment. And if we don't respect everyone's anonymity each day, we can't expect others to respect our own.

As was repeated over and over again at one of my very first AA meetings: Gossip kills. And if you hear something at a meeting that is so "brilliant" that you must repeat it, leave the source out.

In the rooms of AA, I've sat next to an NBA superstar, famous politicians and both movie and TV stars. It took everything in my AA training not to tell anyone, even my wife. I hope and pray that others will do the same for me.

#### MAKING PEACE WITH THE HOLIDAYS



It was 1984 and Christmas was approaching. I hadn't had a visit nor heard from a single friend or relative since I had moved into this recovery house more than three months earlier. I chose to live with the truth that I was the person who left a trail of damage behind me. Loneliness and shame hung heavy on my shoulders that December.

Blessed with the gift of desperation, I continued to take the simple actions I had learned in AA. I kept trudging through my daily recovery routine as if my life depended on it. It did. I maintained meeting attendance. I took on a couple of small commitments that kept me in the fold. These commitments were at meetings that were all within walking distance of my home as I had no car. I later discovered that keeping commitments was an essential part of developing good character.

One of the responsibilities I had volunteered for was to serve as an alternate secretary for a new AA meeting. My turn to chair the meeting happened to land on Christmas Eve. When that night came, the sky drizzled rain off and on. With my Big Book in hand, I pulled a kitchen trash bag over my old woolen sweater and walked to the meeting place about two miles away. I tramped through the wet streets past homes decorated with lights, ornaments and all the reminders of family and the joy of the season. The walk gave me time to think about my ghosts of Christmas past. My father had died on Christmas Eve, a few years before. My drinking and drug abuse ruined many other holidays before and after his death. The holidays were an excuse for days of drinking without guilt or restraint. The days ended up dreadful and lonely as I reinforced my December misery each year.

I arrived at our meeting place early. The room was dark, empty and cold. I opened the doors and turned on the lights and organized chairs for a small group. I made a small pot of coffee and sat alone in the room, waiting for the heater to kick in. I watched the clock as the meeting time came and went. With no place to be, I sat and looked at the meeting format and the slogans on the walls. I just continued to sit. After a while, a man came into the room. He appeared to be 60-something, with graying hair and a gray mustache, neatly dressed in a reindeer sweater and slacks. He had just come from a Christmas party, he told me.

Together, we began the meeting with the usual rituals. We agreed on gratitude as the topic, and we shared our experience, strength and hope with each other. We ended the meeting with the Serenity Prayer and a hug. We wished each other a merry Christmas. After we were done, he gave me a ride back to the recovery home. When I went inside, I ate a slice of pie, said my prayers and crawled into bed. The next morning, I woke up sober. I did not die from loneliness and the world did not come to an end.

That holiday experience changed me. In the years that followed, I chose to put my "magnifying glass" on the joy so many others experience during the holiday season. I could be part of it if I chose, or I could choose not to. I have made that choice every year since 1984.

The memory of my first sober Christmas Eve stays with me today, and I still visit that recovery home nearly every holiday season. Thirty-six sober Christmas Eves later, I share this memory for someone I will likely never meet.

It's my choice: merry Christmas or not. It's up to me.
