SMC Fellowship News



GSO NEWS:

Greetings, San Mateo! My name is Sarah B., and I'm your alcoholic DCMC. Throughout the past year and a half of my service as the chair for District 05 San Mateo general service, I have mostly relied on our groups' GSRs to keep you informed on what's going on in general service. However, I felt compelled to reach out this month because something big is happening for San Mateo.

Since the beginning of the covid-19 pandemic, our District has been conducting all business and events virtually. As a matter of fact, we didn't even have our annual Unity Day in 2020, and it was online in 2021. As some groups within our fellowship have resumed meeting in person, we decided, guided by a loving God as expressed in our group conscience, that it was also time for us to see and interact with one another in person. Therefore, this year's Unity Day will be in person, and we're so excited to meet and see you on Sunday, July 17th from 12-4 at Beresford Recreation Center in San Mateo.

What is Unity Day, anyway? The traditional focus has been to allow our fellowship, not just people involved in General Service, to hear a report from our area delegate on what she saw, felt, and heard at the annual General Service Conference. At the

conference, matters of importance to A.A. as a whole are considered and discussed. An area delegate is our elected trusted servant that represents our Area 06 -from Monterey in the south to Humboldt in the North and Solano in the east. While GSRs have already had the opportunity to hear and ask questions of our delegate and inform their group on the Conference outcomes, I understand that not every group has a GSR and not every GSR has had the chance to do this. So this is your opportunity as an A.A. member to do so! Although our Delegate may not have time to talk about everything that was discussed at the Conference, some results that you might find interesting are that the Conference decided to revise the pamphlet "Do You Think You're Different?" to include stories reflecting greater diversity, a request to reposition "The Doctor's Opinion" back to page one of the Big Book was rejected, further research was requested on the feasibility of a paid placement of PSA videos on streaming platforms, and the conference requested that the Trustees Literature committee review progress reports regarding: 1) the translation of the Big Book fourth edition into plain and simple language, 2) the development of study guide workbooks for AA., and 3) the development of a Fifth edition of the Big Book.

In addition to the report from our Delegate, Unity Day also serves to build fellowship. With your participation in this free event, you'll have access to food, drinks, games, and prizes! Finally, you'll also receive an overview of the various service committees/commitments serving alcoholics in San Mateo County and our Area, as well as how to get involved. 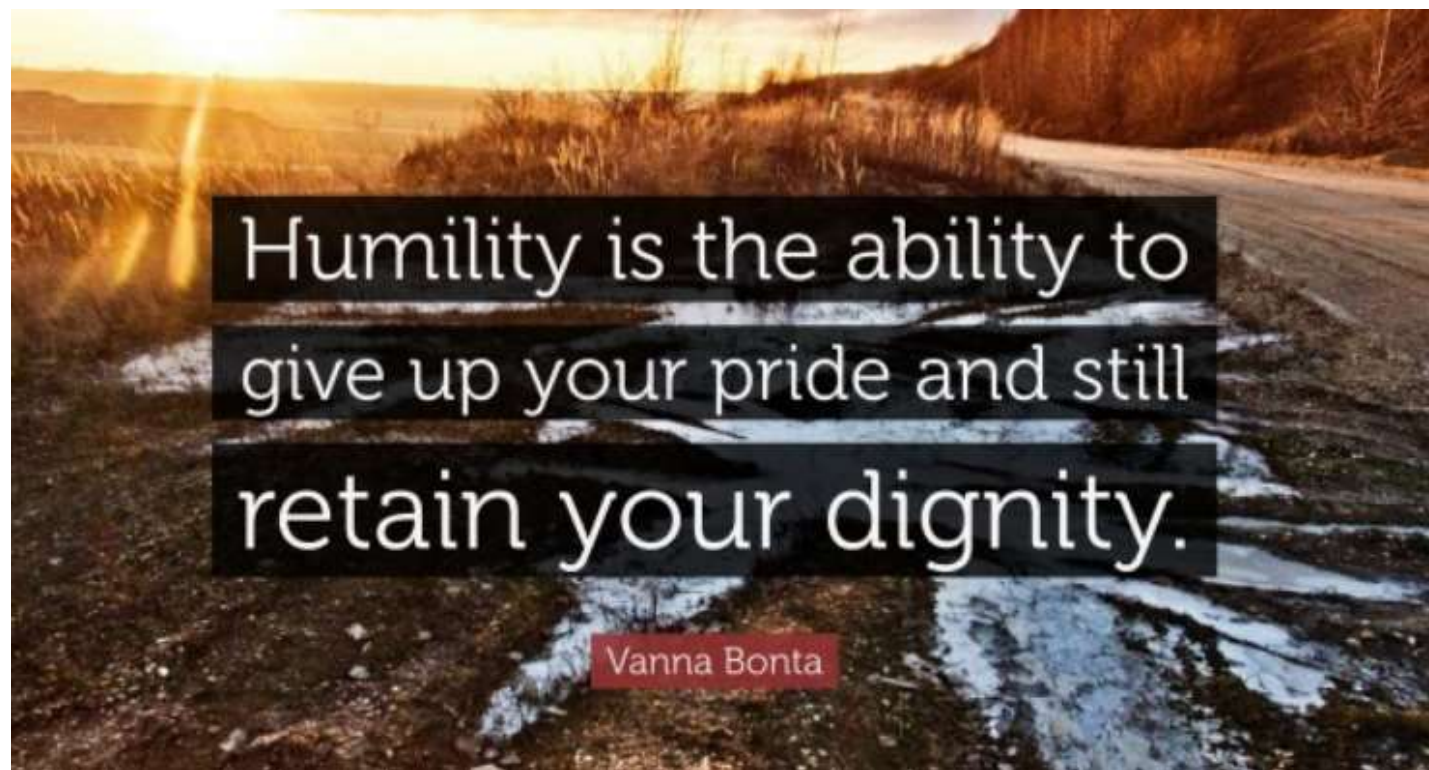

Humility Takes Center Stage

Finally, I would have my moment, if only a brief one, in the AA spotlight. Oh, never mind those leads at my local AA groups, wonderful opportunities that they were to share my experience, strength and hope. This would be big, a gala affair celebrating our cofounder Bill W.'s emergence from the darkness of active alcoholism to sobriety, with as many as 1,500 AA members and their guests present in the grand ballroom of a well-known New York hotel.

Ridiculously egotistical, you might conclude, but I take comfort in that part of our Seventh Step prayer that reads, "...have all of me, good and bad." And maybe we are not the best "deciders" of what is good and bad. Maybe Bill is sounding a caution note that our actions cannot, in all cases, be reduced to one motive. "I hope you too will see the hand of God as you read these pages." So reads the inscription my longtime sponsor Cubby added to the book *AA Comes of Age*, given to me on my first anniversary. And what exactly do we see in reading these pages? On a December day, our cofounder Bill is drinking beer on a New York City subway en route to Towns Hospital for another round of drying out. And yet, within a week in the confines of that hospital, "a wind not of air but of spirit" is blowing through him and he is rendered sober.

Are we not all, in a sense, the children of Bill's "white light" experience and all the wondrous good that has followed from it? Would any of us be here without that moment of surrender in which our cofounder cried out to whatever God there might be to reveal himself? Such was the gist of my script, which I read at the mic, only to learn, from others on the dais, that they could not make out a word I had said. And so began my spiral down.

"Do my words mean nothing?" my mother would say, when exasperated with me as a child. That evening these same words went through my mind, not in the context of a willful child, but as a 72-year-old man whose hope for his polished message to deeply move the masses had been dashed by either his faint voice or a betraying microphone or both.

I had not exactly blazed a path through life in my drinking years. From episodic bouts of drunkenness as a teenager, I passed my 20s increasingly captive to the bottle, with blackouts becoming a frequent occurrence. My life marginalized by active alcoholism, perhaps it should come as no great surprise that I would seek to become famous, as I have heard it said, in an anonymous program. Perhaps I am not alone in this futile pursuit. However, the sober path and life itself require me to make adjustments as I grow older. I'm not sought out to lead meetings as I once was. Newer members do not come to me in the numbers they once did to ask that I sponsor them. The phone doesn't ring as often.

All of us want recognition in some degree, and it cannot be an easy thing to sense that we are not sought after as we once were. But being an elder in the Fellowship has its own rewards. A deeper feeling of peace and serenity has come to me in slowly learning what it means to be "a small part of a great whole."

As I was leaving the dais following the end of the event, a man approached. When asked if I remembered him, I had to say no, but my failure of memory did not dampen his excitement. Some years before, he had attended his first meeting, at which I reached out to him with my phone number. Though he never called or saw me again, he said he mentions me frequently when he shares, and even goes so far as to say that I was instrumental in his getting sober. Whatever benefit I was to him in that one brief meeting, he stood as a timely reminder that it is nowhere written that sounding good at an AA meeting, or striving to become famous in a Fellowship that embraces the principle of anonymity, are priorities in our program of recovery, but relating ourselves to the alcoholic who still suffers will always remain fully half of our primary purpose.

TRADITION SEVEN: *Every A.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.*



Keeping This Thing Afloat

For nearly 40 years, the faith that AA gave her got her through some impossibly lean times. Now it's time to give back

For years now, I've been trying to find a way to express what it means to me to contribute to AA.

I got sober in 1981. Some years have been comfortable, some flush, and some impossibly lean. I once heard a speaker say that she prayed for enough and she always had enough. That really helped me through the hard times. I don't believe in a Santa Claus God who grants my every wish, nor do I believe in a God who does my bidding. But I do believe in a God who has shown me, on the deepest of levels, that I'm always being taken care of. During lean times, I've made a budget to see where I could cut and realized that I couldn't stretch the money to cover the bare necessities. That's when I went on faith, and somehow I found enough.

Alcoholics Anonymous seems to run on a similar faith. It has never been flush. And from what I gather, it doesn't want the complications of being flush. But somehow the General Service Office has squeaked by. Did you know that the maximum AA will accept from any one person in a given year is \$5,000? At the end of our lives, if we want to contribute to AA, the maximum is \$5,000. Very few of our members ever give the maximum.

I have been in general service for a number of years, so I have some insight into the budget on which the New York office runs. It's absolutely amazing what they've been able to accomplish with so little. The GSO hosts the General Service Conference in New York each spring, so delegates from the U.S. and Canada can come together to discuss and vote on issues relevant to AA. The areas pay

what they can to send their delegate to New York, and the General Service Office covers the rest.

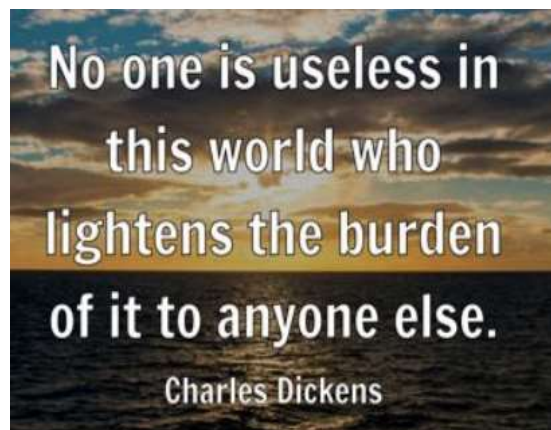
Also, the Big Book is translated into many different languages for countries all over the world. Changes and updates are constantly being made to our literature every year. This costs money.

I remember being in a women's meeting many years ago when we were going through the Traditions. When we got to the Seventh Tradition: "Every A.A. group should be self-supporting, declining outside contributions," I was amazed at the discussion that ensued about putting money in the basket. Each person shared about what a privilege it was to be able to express our gratitude for the life AA has given us. It gives me joy to be able to contribute. It's an action that manifests my prayer that God gives me enough.

In AA, we are never required to contribute. We do it because we are grateful for the life we have been given. If someone doesn't contribute, I have no judgment. It's a personal choice.

I belong to an AA group that unfortunately cannot meet its expenses and contribute to the district, area or GSO, in spite of all the meetings we have. For that reason, and because my heart needs to express my gratitude, I contribute to the GSO. Even just \$5 a month can help our General Service Office continue to provide important life-saving services to alcoholics around the world. Think about it.

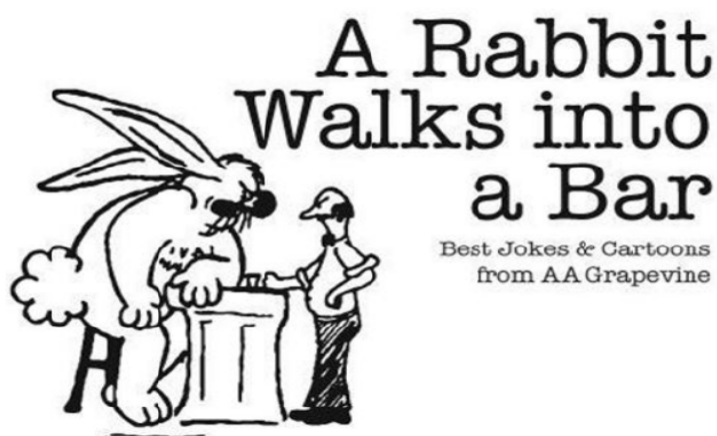
