What does our Central Office do?

The San Mateo County Fellowship's Central Office belongs to the A.A. groups of San Mateo County. We help carry A.A.'s message in the following ways (and more):

- Maintain a 24/7 telephone line which responds to inquiries from still-suffering alcoholics seeking help, A.A. members in need of information, and from members of the professional community and the general public. After office hours, this line is staffed by Teleservice volunteers.
- Maintain a Twelfth Step volunteer list.
- Maintain and publish group meeting schedules, in print, on our website, and in the Meeting Guide App.
- We stock a large selection books and pamphlets for sale (many are available in Spanish).
- We offer sobriety chips for sale, for both individuals and groups.
- We work closely with local A.A. service committees: Bridging the Gap, Hospitals and Institutions, Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community, as well as with San Mateo County General Service District 5 and the Northern California Council of Alcoholics Anonymous
- We support and participate in many local A.A. events such as Unity Day and the holiday Alkathons.
- ❖ We maintain our web site, aa-san-mateo.org, with up-
- to-date meeting listings, a schedule of A.A. events, the High Sobriety newsletter, and links to other A.A. web sites,
- We maintain a library of A.A. speaker CDs which are available for rent for a nominal fee.
- We publish the newsletter, High Sobriety, sent at no charge to all <u>registered</u> San Mateo County A.A. groups and available by subscription to all A.A. members. Faithful Fivers receive a free copy as well.

Who pays for our Central Office? We, the members of A.A., do. Our Seventh Tradition states that we are self-supporting through our own contributions. Central Office also receives donations from individual alcoholics (such as through our Faithful Fivers program). Other sources include our annual anniversary party and income from the sale of A.A. literature.

Central Office has resumed regular hours Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.

STEP ELEVEN: Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.



MAKE ME A CHANNEL

I remember when my sponsor gave me an assignment for Step Eleven. After we reviewed the Step in our book Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, he told me to read the Eleventh Step Prayer every day for 30 days and develop a routine for daily prayer and meditation.

I had been sober for approximately nine months at that time. I was going through a divorce and I was an assistant manager of a sober living environment, but not fully employed.

During this time, I had visitation with my sons every Sunday for a few hours. Just about every week, my soon-to-be ex-wife and I would engage in a heated argument just prior to my visit with my boys, which created a cloud that dampened our visit. To be clear, the cloud quickly disappeared once my boys and I got busy visiting, but they could feel the tension when I picked them up and dropped them off.

But one day, when I made the usual call to my wife to make sure that we were all agreed on the hand-over process (the time the argument usually would start) something really strange happened. Without any forethought or plan on my part, I asked her what she meant by something she said. I was not being sarcastic; I really wanted to understand what she meant, and she could tell I really wanted to understand. As you might imagine, she was a little skeptical, so she was cautious with her response. I restated what she said and asked if that was what she meant. She said yes and I told her

that we agreed. We did not argue. In fact, I have found that this technique works well with most people most of the time.

Then it hit me. The Eleventh Step Prayer was taking hold of me. The prayer says, in part, "Lord, grant that I may seek rather to comfort, than to be comforted—to understand, than to be understood." The lesson here is that prayers must be followed by action. The prayer taught me to give others what I want for myself, and then I will receive. This is consistent with most things in AA. We have to give it away to keep it, we pray for the people we resent to have everything we want for ourselves and we sponsor others so we can stay sober.

Going through the divorce made me feel very lonely, but attending AA meetings helped. I eventually took service commitment as a greeter, which required that I arrive at meetings early to greet people at the door. That's when I made another discovery. I noticed that I was not lonely anymore after the second or third handshake.

My conscious contact with God is the biggest thing in my life today. I am never alone. My only dilemma is who to thank. Do I thank God for bringing me to AA or AA for showing me how to develop a better relationship with God?

I told a very dear friend of mine in the program that I knew that God has been doing his best to help me, but sometimes I could not see how exactly. Eventually, I realized that God had removed everything that was distracting me (job, family, etc.) so I could focus. Left with nothing, I was desperate and had nowhere to go. So he put a few others in my life who showed me to AA. And it was there that I learned how to communicate with him, when I "Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out."

BETTER THAN FOOTBALL AND PIE

I turned my life around in April of 1989. It still amazes me that one day at a time, I could actually live a sober, God-centered life for the next 30 years.

My first few months in AA were hard. After all, this was the longest amount of time that this 50-year-old had ever gone without drinking.

But I was about to be tested. Thanksgiving was approaching. Would I actually be able to pull off an alcohol-free Thanksgiving? Would God give me the strength and courage for that?

How could I go to a holiday get-together without a few drinks first? How would I ever watch football games without beer? How could I go to the Thanksgiving parade without a few "nips" to warm up? How would I enjoy the dinner without a nice bottle of red wine?

Luckily, AA members offered some amazing advice. On Thanksgiving Day, our local meetings held an AA marathon at the church where we met. There were meetings every hour on the hour, from morning to night, with food! Everyone was welcome. It was a safe place to be for us newcomers.

Everyone in our group took part. It was "suggested" that I volunteer to help. At first I told them I was much too busy, but the looks they gave me reminded me of the ones my mother gave me when I was a teenager. I soon realized that their "suggestion" was not really a suggestion, so I pitched in.

So Thanksgiving morning, before my family's celebration began, and before the first football game started, I headed over to the church to help out. When I got to the alcathon, what I saw was amazing. The meeting room was already filled with people, some familiar faces and many I didn't know. Some just came for the coffee, others hung out all day. Many enjoyed the dinner members made, others just ate the amazing desserts. I loved it.

That day, Thanksgiving took on a totally new meaning for me. Instead of worrying and thinking of myself and all my problems, I served food to everyone. Instead of thinking of myself, I spoke with members who had no family at all. Instead of thinking of myself, I listened to newcomers who were close to picking up a drink and needed to talk. Instead of thinking of myself, I met people who actually had no other place to go. And most importantly, instead of thinking of myself, I met spiritual, God-loving people, who taught me the true meaning of Thanksgiving.

That day 30 years ago, in that church basement, my life changed. It became clear to me that compared to many other people's problems, mine weren't so bad. And it also became obvious that in order for me to stay sober and truly live a spiritual life, I'd have to reach out and extend a hand to others.

When I returned home to be with my family that day, I had a whole new attitude. I learned that it's not the food. It's not the football games. It's not the parade. It's not the small talk with a bunch of people I only see on holidays. And it's certainly not the expensive wine! It's about the impact I can have on the life of another human by being useful.

Reach out this Thanksgiving. Hug your kids. Call a friend in trouble. Pray for those less fortunate. These things help me; they can help you too. And I learned all this at an AA alcathon.


