General Service District Committee positions follow a two-year rotation starting January of odd-numbered years. That means my service as chair is ending. As I transition out, I wanted to share some important updates and opportunities.

I'm excited to announce that Brent M. was elected as DCMC for San Mateo General Service for the next two years. Congrats, Brent! While this vital position and a few others have been elected, several district committee positions are still vacant as of my writing of this report. 



A COLD DECEMBER NIGHT

Christmas of 1976 was to be a grand adventure. It began with a ride of more than 24 hours on a bus from Houston, Texas to Chicago. But the trip was not a traditional Christmas visit. My friend was a psychiatric resident, in a large hospital in downtown Chicago. He was scheduled for on-call duty on Christmas Eve. I was a graduate student in clinical psychology and my friend had arranged for me to accompany him while he was on-call.

The early evening was interesting but routine. About 11:30 P.M., we were called to the emergency room and advised that my friend was to evaluate was an alcoholic who had been brought in by people from AA. The patient was a big man, intoxicated but not sloppy drunk. He was red-faced and had graying hair. What I remember most about him was a pervasive sadness. From his dress and grooming he did not appear to be homeless, but it was apparent he was not welcome at home on Christmas Eve.

My friend determined that he was not appropriate for hospital admission. The people who brought him asked if there were any alternatives. On determining the patient was a veteran, my friend contacted the on-call resident physician at the closest VA hospital. My friend's immediate comment after he got off the phone with the VA was that the resident taking the call had just "laughed at me." He wasn't about to admit an alcoholic in the middle of the night on Christmas Eve.

My friend was ready to simply send the man on his way, but those AA people accompanying him pleaded with him to do otherwise. I actually intervened and asked if there was another VA in the area where he might be

admitted. My friend yielded, but said the only other possible VA was far, clear across Chicago from where we were. He made the call and the resident there said they were willing to admit him. "Are you sure he'll go?" my friend asked the people who had brought him in. "Oh, he'll go," they assured us. Did I mention this was Chicago in December? It was cold, snowing and windy. I could see through the glass doors of the emergency room that it was really dark out there. But these two people from AA took off as happily as if they had been given a nice Christmas present.

I had heard of Alcoholics Anonymous before but knew nothing about the organization. My ignorance influenced my perception of the situation. I assumed that like other large service or charitable organizations, AA had volunteers. As soon as I looked at these people from AA, I decided they were not alcoholics but instead were probably volunteers for the organization. These two AA members were about my age, well-spoken and apparently middle-class. They could no more have been alcoholics than I could have been.

But there was no reason to think I was an alcoholic. I had graduated from college and was in a doctoral program. It probably wasn't relevant that I was in my ninth year of a program that was supposed to be completed in five years and had an absolute seven-year deadline. I overlooked the fact that I'd almost flunked out six years before because of drinking and smoking pot every night.

The memory of these "volunteers" stayed with me. I knew something about organizations in general and believed that any organization that could attract volunteers that dedicated and unselfish must have some real substance.

I retained a warm feeling about AA until I arrived on the Fellowship's doorstep about a decade later. It wasn't until after I was in AA that I truly understood that those AA folks had Twelfth Stepped me, as well as the gentleman they were hauling around that cold December night. God bless all three of them.

Tradition Twelve: Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles above personalities.



RESTRAINT OF TONGUE AND MOUSE

Recently, I harmed a fellow AA by using email carelessly and in a way that went against the spirit of our anonymity Traditions. Here's what happened:

Early one morning, I sat down at my computer to spend some time on a website I visit to find out about things going on in local AA. As I clicked on various links, I came across a document that had some content I thought needed to be corrected.

Thinking that I was being helpful, I sent an email to the webmaster of the site. I pointed out the problem and insisted that the document be removed from the website. I included a note to the person who had created the document, suggesting that revisions be made before putting the document back up. I also copied half a dozen or so other AA members on the email, thinking that they might be interested and that they should be informed about the situation. It was early morning, and I needed to get out of the house and on my way about my day, so the email I sent was pretty brief and to-the-point.

The AA member who had created the document replied to everyone, apologizing for any problem with the document and agreeing to make some changes. A revised version was posted shortly, and it seemed that all was well. But then I received a personal reply from the fellow AA who had originally posted the document. It was addressed to me only, and it asked if it had really been necessary for me to include so many people when I distributed the email to address the situation. My fellow AA member felt criticized in front of others and was distressed and unhappy with the way I had handled things.

I felt terrible. I knew that this good AA member hadn't meant to cause harm. The document posted had been intended to generate enthusiasm and interest about an AA event and my fellow alcoholic had only the best in mind for AA when the document was put together. I realized that I had responded in a way that was heavy-handed, clumsy, and not very thoughtful.

I knew about the limitations of email--how the nuance of a smile, a kind tone of voice, and a friendly handshake are missing. The email I had sent and copied to others had been quick and brief--making it come across as cold and business-like. Through a series of exchanges, I made amends and reflected on the lessons. I realized that how I use email can go against our anonymity Traditions, even when everyone addressed in an email exchange already knows that all involved are in AA.

The spirit of Tradition Twelve calls on us to address each other as equals who deserve dignity and respect, and to practice a genuine humility. But instead, I acted like the AA Traditions police, and I had done so in front of others.


Most of the time, when we think about anonymity and new media, we tend to focus on Tradition Eleven and the issue of last names, pictures, and the Internet. Is the Internet the same as "press, radio, and films"? Do we need to guard our own and others' anonymity when posting to social networking sites? Is an obscure AA website, most likely accessed only by AA members, something that we need to police with diligence to make sure there are no anonymity breaks on it?

We can have disagreements and spirited discussions about these sorts of questions. But if we feel a need to address something we see, we need to remember the spirit of Tradition Twelve and respond with humility and a spirit of equality. So, the next time I see something posted on the Internet that moves me to raise these issues with a fellow member, I pray that I will remember to pause and do it the old-fashioned AA way--by making a simple phone call so that one alcoholic can talk to another.


