

What does our Central Office do?

The San Mateo County Fellowship's Central Office belongs to the A.A. groups of San Mateo County. We help carry A.A.'s message in the following ways (and more):

- Maintain a 24/7 telephone line which responds to inquiries from still-suffering alcoholics seeking help, A.A. members in need of information, and from members of the professional community and the general public. After office hours, this line is staffed by Teleservice volunteers.
- Maintain a Twelfth Step volunteer list.
- Maintain and publish group meeting schedules, in print, on our website, and in the Meeting Guide App.
- We stock a large selection books and pamphlets for sale (many are available in Spanish).
- We offer sobriety chips for sale, for both individuals and groups.
- We work closely with local A.A. service committees: Bridging the Gap, Hospitals and Institutions, Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community, as well as with San Mateo County General Service District 5 and the Northern California Council of Alcoholics Anonymous
- We support and participate in many local A.A. events such as Unity Day and the holiday Alkathons.
- ❖ We maintain our web site, aa-san-mateo.org, with up-
- to-date meeting listings, a schedule of A.A. events, the High Sobriety newsletter, and links to other A.A. web sites,
- We maintain a library of A.A. speaker CDs which are available for rent for a nominal fee.
- We publish the newsletter, High Sobriety, sent at no charge to all <u>registered</u> San Mateo County A.A. groups and available by subscription to all A.A. members. Faithful Fivers receive a free copy as well.

Who pays for our Central Office? We, the members of A.A., do. Our Seventh Tradition states that we are self-supporting through our own contributions. Central Office also receives donations from individual alcoholics (such as through our Faithful Fivers program). Other sources include our annual anniversary party and income from the sale of A.A. literature.

Central Office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.

MY PRAYER WAS ANSWERED

I would say out loud in meetings that, "God let me down. I went to church and was praying to stop drinking and now I'm stuck here in AA." Finally a guy crosstalked me.

Like most of us, I knew I was in trouble with alcohol long before I came to AA. During the last two years of my drinking, I went back to church to pray my drinking away. I'd go to church and just pray about my drinking. Then I'd get home from church and I'd be drinking again. It just wasn't working.

I crashed and burned and finally took that longest walk of my life to the door of an AA meeting. When I got through the door, I found the people inside were praying and talking all this God stuff. I just wanted to run, but I stuck it out.

I would say out loud in meetings that, "God let me down. I went to church and was praying to stop drinking and now I'm stuck here in AA." Finally a guy crosstalked me and told me that my prayer had been answered because I had arrived at the place where I could stop drinking.

That hit me like a brick wall. His comment gave me hope that my prayer had indeed been answered and that I truly was somewhere where I could stop drinking. He was right. My prayer was answered.

About two years later I was at a Roundup in the mountains of Virginia. At a workshop after the AA speaker meeting, we were all asked to share about "When and how I came to believe"

As soon as that question was posed, I flashed back to that meeting in early sobriety when that guy told me my prayer had been answered. That was the moment I came to believe in a power greater than myself. Turns out the Second Step was working me before I even knew it was working me. That memory has sustained me and gives me hope and strength to stay sober to this day.

ONE HOT TEXAS SUMMER

One of my favorite AA jokes is: What's the difference between a group conscience meeting and the Cub Scouts? The answer: The Cub Scouts have adult supervision! Another is: What's the biggest problem with a group business meeting? Answer: It's run by a bunch of drunks!

It was pointed out to me many years ago by an old-timer that the key word in Tradition Two is "may." " ... there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience."Being taught early on that service to my home group is an obligation, not an option, I have been involved in business meetings almost from the beginning. But it hasn't always been an easy road for me to trudge.

What's always amazed me is that in most cases, we can be diametrically opposed on an issue, express those opinions during a business meeting, then hold hands and pray and exchange hugs afterward. That's been the case in almost every issue I've experienced, with one major exception: I had to watch my first home group die due to a break in this and other Traditions.

At that business meeting a well-respected old-timer found it necessary to attack another member. He felt she was abusing her use of the key to the meeting room by taking advantage of the air conditioning during the hot Texas summer. Rather than resolve the issue one-on-one, he chose to demand that something be done. The "discussion" turned quite ugly. What happened after that was painful.

Our group, which often had 30 to 40 members, split in two. Quite quickly, our group, which had a reputation in the area as one of the strongest around, imploded. People resigned offices and began attending other groups. Attendance went down and it began to become harder and harder to pay the bills. In a matter of months, the decision became very clear—it was time to close the doors. Locking the door for the last time was one of the hardest things I had to endure in my early sobriety.

Two other groups sprang from the ashes of that one, but neither could regain the lost momentum. After much struggling, they closed. The irony of the whole incident is that the two members of the original group had long made their amends to each other and had rebuilt their friendship.

In the years hence I've had three other home groups. Through it all, our members for the most part have experienced the unity we so desperately need through the Traditions.In the appendices of the Big Book, the introduction to the AA Tradition reads:


" ... no society of men and women ever had a more urgent need for continuous effectiveness and permanent unity. We alcoholics see that we must work together and hang together, else most of us will finally die alone."

During any controversy at a group conscience meeting, I always try to keep in mind what that old-timer told me so long ago, that the key word in Tradition Two is "may." But whether God expresses himself or the decision is made because of a handful of "bleeding deacons," my home group is still my family.

My prayer is that I never again have to experience what I went through in my first home group. But if I do, I hope we can resolve those differences with the help of God and continue to hang together. We must, because the option our co-founder pointed out is to die alone, and by incorporating the program in our daily lives, that should not have to be an option for any of us.
