



## What does our Central Office do?

The San Mateo County Fellowship's Central Office belongs to the A.A. groups of San Mateo County. We help carry A.A.'s message in the following ways (and more):

- Maintain a 24/7 telephone line which responds to inquiries from still-suffering alcoholics seeking help, A.A. members in need of information, and from members of the professional community and the general public. After office hours, this line is staffed by Teleservice volunteers.
- Maintain a Twelfth Step volunteer list.
- Maintain and publish group meeting schedules, in print, on our website, and in the Meeting Guide App.
- We stock a large selection books and pamphlets for sale (many are available in Spanish).
- We offer sobriety chips for sale, for both individuals and groups.
- We work closely with local A.A. service committees: Bridging the Gap, Hospitals and Institutions, Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community, as well as with San Mateo County General Service District 5 and the Northern California Council of Alcoholics Anonymous
- We support and participate in many local A.A. events such as Unity Day and the holiday Alkathons.
- ❖ We maintain our web site, aa-san-mateo.org, with up-
- to-date meeting listings, a schedule of A.A. events, the High Sobriety newsletter, and links to other A.A. web sites,
- We maintain a library of A.A. speaker CDs which are available for rent for a nominal fee.
- We publish the newsletter, High Sobriety, sent at no charge to all <u>registered</u> San Mateo County A.A. groups and available by subscription to all A.A. members. Faithful Fivers receive a free copy as well.

Who pays for our Central Office? We, the members of A.A., do. Our Seventh Tradition states that we are self-supporting through our own contributions. Central Office also receives donations from individual alcoholics (such as through our Faithful Fivers program). Other sources include our annual anniversary party and income from the sale of A.A. literature.

Central Office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.

ON A MISSION

I walked through the doors of AA on September 19, 2011. I remember the date clearly. The night before I had blacked out once again, making a fool of myself, hurting those closest to me. I woke up that morning with incomprehensible demoralization. I knew I had to stop drinking.

I got a sponsor, a home group and a Big Book. People in meetings suggested that I go to 90 meetings in 90 days and read the book. And that's exactly what I did. I worked the first three Steps and felt great. Work was better, my relationship with my wife was better, life was better. It was the first time in a long time that I could remember being OK with being alive.

That's when my sponsor suggested I do my Fourth Step. It looked scary to me, not because of what I would have to write down, but because I was terrified I'd do it wrong and look stupid. I couldn't face sharing those fears with anyone, so I just didn't do my Fourth Step. I figured I'd just go to meetings and try to be a good person. I convinced myself that I'd remain sober. My sponsor warned me that if I didn't do the Fourth and Fifth Steps I would possibly relapse. I thought he was being a jerk.

One Saturday I left my AA meeting with no thought at all of drinking. Within two blocks the thought that a beer would be nice suddenly came into my mind. The next thing I knew it was Friday night and I was driving to my hometown with a handgun to shoot my little brother in the head. He had called me and was upset that I had gone to our parents' house and created a drunken scene there that caused a lot of pain and heartache. He said I had broken my dad's heart and created such a scene that

my mom had to go to the ER with intense chest pains. I'm so thankful that I did not make it back to my hometown that night to "deal" with my brother.

When I woke the next morning, I was once again a broken man, crying into the arms of my wife. I pleaded with God to take my life. Instead, God gave me the courage to pick up the phone and call the man who had foretold my future—the man who told me I might relapse. He was someone with a real answer. That man dropped everything that Saturday morning and came to my apartment. He walked with me through the hell I was going through.

As I look back over that relapse, I realize how divinely ordered my life is. I know that God is working everything out. I was afraid of going back to AA because I felt like a phony. I had let everyone down. I was afraid that I'd be judged a failure. But when I walked back into my home group, I was received with open arms, without judgment. I learned from my sponsor and the oldtimers—and now from my own experience—how vitally important the Steps are, all of them.

One of the most beautiful moments in my life followed that relapse. The day I walked back into AA I learned an important lesson: AA members are loving and kind, and they don't shoot their wounded. They carry you through the pain and wounds until you can walk again.

The man I called sponsor dropped everything that morning and came and sat with me and talked me from the ledge. He never asked me for anything. As he left my apartment that morning, he gave me a hug. He said he was glad I called and that he loved me. Through my painful relapse I got to learn the most important lesson ever: Love heals the broken

## MESSAGE FROM GENERAL SERVICE

Greetings District 05. Our district conducted its agenda topics workshop on February 26 th describing the origins of the agenda topics, the process of informing the group and obtaining group conscience and the art of distilling down group discussion notes into a report without distortion of the message. We utilized the "juicy" agenda item Finance F that asked if we should discuss changing our founders' writings. This led to some great discussion and as with every agenda topic session I have ever attended, I learned something.

First weekend in March is the Pacific Region AA Service Assembly, PRASSA. The pacific region consists of AK, AZ, CA, HI, ID, NV, OR, UT and WA with BC/Yukon participating as an honorary member. PRAASA is 1,200 or so AA service nerds discussing agenda topics and other matters pertaining to the governance of Alcoholics Anonymous. This year was at a hotel next to LAX and the warm sunny weather I was hoping for was not to be. It was a great opportunity to hear what folks in other states are thinking about on matters pertaining to AA. Next year, 2024, PRASSA will be in San Francisco on March 1 st -3 rd so mark your calendar, it's an experience you will not want to miss.


In our March business meeting we discussed the details of reporting our group conscience at the pre-conference assembly coming up April 1 st and 2 nd in Richmond, see CNCA06.org for details. This was preceded by an excellent presentation from our visiting area officer. They expressed the rewards that being of service has brought them and their experience in the agenda topics process. Trust was a word that came up often. That from humble beginnings they learned to trust others. As they learned to trust they begin to earn the trust of their fellows. The result being the opportunity to be a part of the miracle that is alcoholics anonymous. Our business meeting then discussed how one distills down the notes from an agenda topics session into a coherent report. Concept three, the right to decision, was invoked to describe the rights and responsibility GSR's have in reporting a group conscience.

Also, in our March business meeting we discussed the format of our meeting currently held online only, hybrid or not to hybrid was the question. As a result, we have formed an ad-hoc committee to evaluate the options and requirements of moving our business meeting to a hybrid format. We are fortunate to have great area committees that we will be contacting for technical support. We do not have to reinvent the internet.

As a reminder we have started a Service Manual study group that meets at 6:15pm to 6:45pm on the third Tuesday, same log in as our district meeting that starts at 7:30pm. In March we went over the Forward, in April we will be going over the Introduction. The time is also intended as an "Ask the District Committee Member Chair (DCMC)" and is an opportunity for anyone with questions regarding general service in AA to ask them.
