What does our Central Office do?

The San Mateo County Fellowship's Central Office belongs to the A.A. groups of San Mateo County. We help carry A.A.'s message in the following ways (and more):

- Maintain a 24/7 telephone line which responds to inquiries from still-suffering alcoholics seeking help, A.A. members in need of information, and from members of the professional community and the general public. After office hours, this line is staffed by Teleservice volunteers.
- Maintain a Twelfth Step volunteer list.
- Maintain and publish group meeting schedules, in print, on our website, and in the Meeting Guide App.
- We stock a large selection books and pamphlets for sale (many are available in Spanish).
- ❖ We offer sobriety chips for sale, for both individuals and groups.
- We work closely with local A.A. service committees: Bridging the Gap, Hospitals and Institutions, Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community, as well as with San Mateo County General Service District 5 and the Northern California Council of Alcoholics Anonymous
- We support and participate in many local A.A. events such as Unity Day and the holiday Alkathons.
- ❖ We maintain our web site, aa-san-mateo.org, with up-
- to-date meeting listings, a schedule of A.A. events, the High Sobriety newsletter, and links to other A.A. web sites,
- We maintain a library of A.A. speaker CDs which are available for rent for a nominal fee.
- We publish the newsletter, High Sobriety, sent at no charge to all registered San Mateo County A.A. groups and available by subscription to all A.A. members. Faithful Fivers receive a free copy as well.

Who pays for our Central Office? We, the members of A.A., do. Our Seventh Tradition states that we are self-supporting through our own contributions. Central Office also receives donations from individual alcoholics (such as through our Faithful Fivers program). Other sources include our annual anniversary party and income from the sale of A.A. literature.



A Job Well Done

When I first started coming to AA I was peppered with all sorts of suggestions. One that really stuck out was to do a "90 in 90." But being an alcoholic, I needed to overdo the hell out of that, so I sometimes attended three to five meetings a day.

At every meeting I went to, people spoke about the importance of service work. One day I was at my third meeting. It was called the "Noon Oldtimers" meeting and the topic was about service work being a vital part of recovery. The chairperson talked about how that group had not had a GSR for nine months. At the end of the meeting I approached the chairperson and said, "I don't know what a GSR is but I'll do it." He asked me what my sobriety date was. "What's that?" I replied. "Well, how long has it been since your last drink?" he asked. "I don't know exactly," I answered. "Something like 10 days." He then asked me, "How serious are you about this program?" My response was one simple word with a tone of the utmost seriousness. "Deadly," I said.

The oldtimer looked up and said to the room, "Motion to make this guy our GSR. All those in favor?" Two old guys raised their hands and said, "Aye," in unison. The chairperson congratulated me on becoming the GSR and told me the date and address for the next district meeting.

When the day came to go to the district meeting, I was ready to give up on AA. The man who I had been calling every day hoping that he would sponsor me had stopped taking my calls. I hadn't heard back from him in three whole days. In this case the hand of AA was not there, and for that I was resentful. I was so angry I headed for the nearest liquor store. On my way I found myself driving past some stupid church with a sign board that had some corny message on it. But a street number on that sign for some reason jumped out at me.

I immediately pulled over and searched through my things looking for clues as to why that number meant something to me. Then I found it. In my calendar I saw that in about five minutes at that very church I was scheduled to attend my first district meeting as a new GSR. Immediately I abandoned the liquor store idea and went inside the church.

After the meeting, one of the women asked me how I was doing. "Funny you should ask," I replied, "I was on my way to the liquor store before I stopped here for this meeting." "Why did you stop?" she asked. "Because I want nothing more than to stop drinking," I replied. "But it seems like nobody will help me."

"Well, take out your AA coin," she said. "I want to show you something." I did as she asked. "See that triangle?" she said, pointing at the coin. "Recovery is the Twelve Steps. Unity is going to meetings and making friends. Service is what you just did as the GSR. Now, let's look at unity, service and recovery as three legs to a stool." "But I'm missing a sobriety leg," I said. "Nobody will help me with the Steps." "Yes, but think for just a second about how long you can stand on one leg." she said. "Not very long," I answered. "How about two legs? How long can you stand on two legs?" she asked. "All day," I replied. "That's perfect," she said. "Because this is a 24-hour program. Just for today you don't have to drink. If you stick with the unity and service long enough, you will find your sponsor."

So I kept being the GSR. I also stepped up for district corrections chair, said yes to every service commitment that was asked of me. Those district chairs took me through the Twelve Concepts and Twelve Traditions. Eventually, I found my sponsor, who took me through the Twelve Steps and the Big Book line by line and explained to me what everything meant.

Last Sunday I celebrated my fifth year of sobriety. I will forever be grateful for those oldtimers and nice women who saved my life. I stayed sober by being honest and thorough in the face of fear and uncertainty. And what do you know? I actually got sober going to AA business meetings!

MESSAGE FROM GENERAL SERVICE

Greetings District 05 of California Northern Coastal Area 06 of AA, aka San Mateo County. First up HAPPY NEW YEAR. I pray that WE all enjoy a safe, sane and prosperous 2024.

In our district's General Service efforts, the new year means time to get busy preparing for Agenda Topics that will be released in February. Agenda Topics are an opportunity for the members to express their opinions on matters pertaining to how AA operates. Through this process we transform personal, group, district and area opinions into a fellowship conscious. As such, Agenda Topics are the vehicle that our AA groups use to drive the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous. Agenda topics are a request that our General Service Conference take some sort of action. Agenda topics can be initiated by anyone in AA by completing a request form that asks the applicant to address some questions regarding the request. It is suggested that the applicant attempt to get group, district and if possible, area support for potential agenda items.

Agenda Topics cover a wide range. They can involve planning, such as a request for topics for future workshops. An Agenda Topic can be a request to review existing service material, such as a review of the Public Information Workbook, or a review of existing literature, such as a request to revise the pamphlet "Do You Think Differently". Agenda Topics can also be a request to generate new literature, such as the request to generate a "Plain Language" Big Book that was passed several years ago.

How does one make their opinion heard on a Topic? General Service Representatives will be collecting group conscious on selected Topics in late February and through March. Don't have a GSR? Your opinion can still be heard by attending the Pre-Conference Assembly April 6 and 7 in Petaluma. Anyone can go to the microphone and express their opinions. The Agenda Topics will be released in February, stay tuned.

I did want to bring to everyone's attention that there will be an Informational Session regarding the drafting of a Common Language Big Book that will be hosted by pour area delegate Eric. It is an online only event, zoom id: 842 6106 1894 pass code:1935. A competed draft of the Common language BB will be reviewed at the 2024 General Service Conference in late April. A portion of the draft was reviewed by Area Delegates in 2023 and the responsive was a favorable one. The draft Common Language BB will not be published without approval of the General Service Conference.

Lastly there has been a request by our General Service Board (aka Trustee's) regarding how we should consider our founder's writings. There is a letter and a suggested list of questions seeking a response that was sent out, contact your GSR or myself for a copy. There is a voice within AA that seeks to modify our founder's writings to upgrade historical references to more current ones and to revise some of the language whose meaning has changed over time. This voice seeking change, in my observation, is a small but growing voice in the fellowship at the moment. As a result of this growing voice the Trustee's are requesting input on how the fellowship would implement any changes should that voice become the majority. It is a bit of future tripping in that the Trustee's are asking for input about a "what if" situation. What if the majority suddenly decides they want to change the literature?? Is there acceptance or is there "I'm taking my toys and going home"?? Is there a plan or is there chaos? In my discussions with members about this I encourage all to engage in the process. For those in favor I suggest engaging to ensure the process is not too tedious, for those against it's the opposite, I encourage them to consider how to make the process as difficult as possible. For example, there is a process to change our Traditions, It requires written approval from two thirds of all groups worldwide. Not impossible but about as close as you can get. In any event one thing is clear, WE must talk about this, it's an elephant that needs released.
